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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dr. R. G. Bhoyar Arts, Commerce & Science College, Seloo, Dist. Wardha is governed by Vidyabharti Sanstha, Wardha situated in mid of Vidarbha region 16 km away from Wardha and 65 km from Nagpur in Maharashtra on State Highway and affiliated to RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur. The Institute has established in 2008 by Dr. R.G. Bhoyar, President of Vidyabharti Sanstha, Wardha and has completed 15 years of its existence. It is one of the emerging institutes of higher education in the Vidarbha region. Seloo is well connected by road; maximum students in the college are from Wardha district. The college being accredited with 'B+' by NAAC on 28th March 2017 in the First cycle.

There are three undergraduate programmes, seven graduate programmes, and one doctoral programme for students interested in the arts, sciences, commerce, and management. RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur, is affiliated with the college. For students, the institution has introduced M. Com in 2018, M. Sc. Zoology and Botany in 2019, M. Sc. Physics in 2020, and M. Sc. Chemistry, Microbiology, and MBA in 2022.

The institution at present has 24 permanent and 31 Full time teaching staff with 23 non-teaching staff. The college has 01 research centers in the subjects of Commerce. Presently, there are 07 faculty members who are Research Guides. The institutional premise is spread over the land of 6 Acres. The total built-up area of the institution is 5143.64 sq. mt. The total area of the Central Library is 191.69 sq. mt. It is equipped with facilities like a computer with net connectivity and reprography. There is a provision for barcoding of books, an Online Public Access Catalogue, access to e-journals and online database and N-LIST INFLIBNET (6000 e-journals and e-books) facility. The Central Library has 5507 textbooks, 376 reference books, 24 journals and 20 CDs.

Additionally, we encourage students to enrol in online skill-based certificate courses offered by NTEPL and SWAYAM, which they can do by themselves. Every year, we also set up soft skills training programmes for our pupils. As a result, our students acquire professional and technical abilities that increase their employability. We have introduced certain certificate programmes in spoken English, Sericulture, and Taly to provide education with values. In addition to this, we host guest lectures, programmes, and activities on constitutional principles and awareness, human values, scientific temper, and nonviolence. A number of designated days are also observed in order to help us develop our students into thoughtful and accountable citizens.</p>

Performance standards are mostly dependent on the curriculum that is presented in the classroom throughout the academic term. The new STEAM approach under NEP placed a strong emphasis on hands-on, application-based learning and internships based on research. Students will be given internship opportunities with local businesses, communities, and industries as part of a comprehensive, all-encompassing education, as well as research internships to increase their employability.</p>

Distance education/online education:	<p>The college is already prepared for the teaching and learning process, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, by utilizing a digital platform for engaging theory and practical classes, conducting conferences and meetings. Online education has broken down geographical barriers, allowing experts and students from different locations to interact. The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled, so online education is not a problem. A number of online platforms have emerged from the tech world to provide education via the internet. Students and faculty members fully utilised the online teaching platforms and continued to perform their academic duties for delivering online classes via modules such as Google Meet, Zoom Meet, Google Class Room, OBS system wise-app, Whatsapp and our teachers and students have been acquainted with the online teaching-learning method. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The College is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj University, Nagpur and strictly follows curriculum designed by affiliating University. The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process to achieve academic excellence & professional competency by adopting academic flexibility measures.

Academic Planning

The Principal and all department heads decide the academic schedule at the beginning of each academic year. The relevant committee creates the timetable based on the workload of each course in accordance with the established university policies. Department heads hold meetings with professors to decide on the department's timetable, extracurricular activities, and task distribution. To close the gap, an induction programme is held for the new student batches. Each faculty member adheres carefully to the timetable, creates a micro-teaching plan, and also keeps track of students' academic progress in a diary. Every subject teacher uses teaching aids to make classes effective, including models, specimens, and charts in addition to the usage of Power Point Presentations. The students are given Powerpoint presentations, soft and hard copies, CDs, and website URLs to further their education.

Students keep a record book of their practical experiences, which an attentive teacher checks. The college moved its extracurricular and co-curricular activities to an online format during the Covid 19 pandemic. For lectures and internal evaluation, faculty members also use the Zoom platform, YouTube, Google Meet, and Google Class Room. The lecturers virtually demonstrated the experiments. To ensure that the curriculum is planned and implemented effectively, teachers are given the responsibility of a number of duties.

- A dedicated in-charge teacher for a student group takes care of students regarding academic performance, scholarships, examinations and other problems.
- Continuous monitoring of the students is apart of internal assessment. Faculty members are available after class hours to clear the students' doubts. Simplification of curriculum delivery through teaching outside the classroom.
- Industrial visits to understand production, technical and manufacturing processes.

Program outcome and course outcome are well defined and disseminated to all the stakeholders through websites. Progress of the syllabus and curriculum delivery is reviewed from time to time. Guest lecturers of eminent academicians and industrialists are organized on current trends related to curriculum.

The collected and analyzed feedback on curricula is communicated to concern body for upgrading purpose. Many teachers are involved in revision of curriculum as a member of university academic bodies e.g. BOS, Senate, RRC etc.

Institute encouraged teachers to attend orientation and refresher programmes in respective subjects to acquaint themselves with the depth of theory, practical and the reference material. It is further supplemented by various workshops, teachers' training programs, short term courses conducted by Academic Staff Colleges and other institutes. The institute encouraged teachers to attend meetings of various academic bodies like Academic Council, faculty of streams and Board of Studies etc.

ICT facilities and resource material support from Library (like e- journals, N-List, INFLIBNET, DELNET etc.) helped in effective implementation of the curriculum.

The Curriculum incorporates cross-cutting issues such as Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability. All college systems incorporate issues concerning Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, and the Environment and Sustainability. They primarily comprise the Generic Elective courses offered through the Choice Based Credit System, but there are also independent programmes based on these issues. B.Sc. 2nd year in Environmental Science, U.G. in Arts, and Certificate Courses are among them. Almost all regular U.G. and P.G. programmes incorporate these issues as separate courses. Experimental learning:

- 2.Students participate in various Hands-on-trainings and workshops to gain the knowledge of updated techniques.
- 3.The college invites various experts from other colleges to share their experiences with the students.
- 4.Demonstrations of models, slides, specimens and charts which take students beyond classrooms to foster their critical thinking and enhance their interpretation capabilities.
- 5.The College has Central Library provides internet facilities, access to texts, reference books, Educational CDs and DVDs.

Participative Learning:

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institute is affiliated with RTM Nagpur University in Nagpur and follows the curriculum of the university. In terms of Internal Assessment, the institute follows the pattern of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur. The University's examination reforms, such as question paper pattern, marking scheme, and internal assessment, are strictly implemented by the college.

The syllabus is detailed and divided into sections for the students. The evaluation reforms and approaches of the institution are addressed in the following manner. The preliminary examination is administered by the college to monitor students' progress. The preliminary examination question paper pattern is the same as the university examination, which is held at the end of the semester. For each subject, departments create Question Banks.

Teachers provide students with a clear understanding of what to expect and advise them on appropriate methodology for writing answers and resolving difficulties in accordance with the university question format. Practicals are scheduled according to the University's calendar. Students are given assignments based on the course content.

Evaluation begins on the day of the test at the college level. Students are shown valuable answer scripts; discrepancies are promptly corrected by teachers and communicated to students, ensuring the effectiveness of the examination while the subject is still fresh in their minds. Teachers can access the work and point out mistakes, as well as make suggestions to improve the quality of the work. It assists students in identifying their strengths and weaknesses, as well as working on problem areas.

The subject teacher has been appointed as an internal examiner for the submission of final Internal Assessment marks to the University. Students are invited to submit examination-related complaints and issues to the college Examination Committee. The committee operates in accordance with the university's rules, regulations, and directives.

The committee takes impartial initiatives to provide transparent justification for student grievances. Every subject teacher evaluated answer sheets for theory, practical, and unit tests and declared results on time.

The Principal verifies the assessment reports of the students' preliminary examinations at the end of each semester, as well as the university results discussed in the meeting. The Principal makes recommendations to teachers on how to improve their performance.

The College Examination Committee handles any grievances regarding results, corrections in mark sheets, and other University examination-related issues by communicating the matter to the University Examination Section. Students who have complaints about the evaluation of their answer books can request a reassessment of their answer books at the university by paying the necessary fees.

Students are made aware of these during new student orientation programmes as well as at the start of each semester. Students are mentored as needed to ensure that they achieve the desired results.

College examination committee as well as all the UG and PG departments assesses Program outcomes and course specific outcomes of the students by formal and informal methods. Subject wise analysis of University examination results shows the comparative performance of students in examination. These data helps in understanding the areas of academic weakness of students. Overall results analysis of the subject help in making efforts to make the teaching methods more learners oriented. Concern teacher of the subject is asked to undertake remedial measures to improve the results. Formative assessment is done on the basis of attendance during academic session, performance in class unit tests, preliminary examination which was conducted at the end of the semester, completion of assignments given, participation in co-curricular activities, group discussion, educational visits, seminars, quiz, etc. Unit tests and preliminary examinations as per the University pattern are conducted prior to University examination. Because of this practice, slow learners and advanced learners can be identified and student's performance can be improved by providing the proper guidance and extra coaching.

Through the seminars and group discussions, the thinking ability of the students is also assessed and the

skills and knowledge is tested. The activities which are conducted during the wildlife week celebration like Bird Watching, Wildlife photography competition and Poster Competition help the institution to know the affection of students towards the wildlife conservation and protection. The institute also works hard to attain better results in course outcomes and programme outcomes by organizing various activities and participation of the students in University level cultural and sports competition. The home assignments are given to the UG and PG students in order to encourage attitudes for self study among them. Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refers to the legal rights granted to the inventor or manufacturer to protect their invention or manufacture product. These legal rights confer an exclusive right on the inventor/manufacturer or its operator who makes full use of it's his invention/product for a limited period of time.

In other words, we can say that the legal rights prohibit all others from using the Intellectual Property for commercial purposes without the prior consent of the IP rights holder. IP rights include trade secrets, utility models, patents, trademarks, geographical indications, industrial design, layout design of

integrated circuits, copyright and related rights, and new varieties of plants. It is very well settled that IP plays an important role in the modern economy.

The scope of IP rights is broad; two classification modes are used to determine whether IP is copyright or Industrial Property. Industrial properties include patents or inventions, trademarks, trade names, biodiversity, plant breeding rights and other commercial interests. A patent gives its holder the exclusive right to use the Intellectual Property for the purposes of making money from the invention.

An invention is itself a new creation, process, machine or manufacture. Having copyright does not give you the exclusive right to an idea, but it protects the expression of ideas that are different from a patent. Copyright covers many fields, from art and literature to scientific works and software.

For the circulation of library books; stock items, including the issue and return of books by students and staff members, the institute employs a computerized system. The library also has a mobile-based OPAC system (M-OPAC) that users can access from anywhere on their mobile phones. An Institutional Repository has been established using open-access digital library software.

The Institute's library is a UGC Network Resource Centre where college staff and students can access the internet. The Library offers a reprography service. The Institutional Repository was built with open-source digital library software. The Institute has book, journal, e-journal, e-book, e-Shodh-Sindhu, and e-Shodh-Ganga subscriptions.

Response:

Governing Body: According to RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur Ordinance no. 24 Chapter-II, the Governing Body has ten members: five from the Vidyabharti Santha and five from an eminent educational background. The Chairman and Secretary are the office bearers, and there are three teacher representatives and one non-teaching staff representative.

College Development Committee: The Local Management Council (LMC) has been replaced by the College Development Committee under the Maharashtra Public University Act 2016. (CDC). The formation of a College Development Committee signals an increase in the institute's interest among stakeholders. It has assisted the college administration in developing novelty in the process of bringing overall development in departments such as academic and administration.

Administrative Set Up: The administration is led by the Secretary and the Principal, with the former having final authority over all financial matters. The Principal is in charge of the college's day-to-day operations. He has a team of Department Heads, the IQAC Coordinator and the Head Clerk to help him with this task.

The Functions of Various Bodies: The Finance Sub-Committee, the Buildings Sub-Committee and the Sub-Committee take important decisions regarding finance, building construction, Renovation and maintenance and issues related to the college. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The following are the welfare schemes available to both teaching and non-teaching staff.

1. The college has a credit cooperative society for its employees, which provides loans for a range of needs. The majority of the teaching and non-teaching staff is cooperative society members.
2. Offering health coverage reimbursement and maternity/paternity leave to staff members in accordance with State Government regulations.
3. The Bank of Maharashtra offers teaching and non-teaching staff members a two-month salary credit facility.
4. Faculty members are granted all statutory leaves, and teaching staff members are given "On Duty Leaves" to attend Orientation Programmes and Refresher Courses.
5. The College promotes faculty participation in conferences and seminars at all levels. For faculty members who present papers at seminars and conferences, the College frequently pays their registration fees.
6. The college encourages academic departments to submit applications for major and minor research projects.

The college follows the "Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS)" of UGC regulations of June, 2009. The University has developed an "Academic Performance Indicator (API) System" based on PBAS guidelines developed by UGC. The API is divided into three categories.

Category-I: Teaching, learning and evaluation related activities having maximum score 125.

Category-II: Co-curricular, extension and professional development related activities having maximum score 50.

Category-III: Research publications and academic contributions, no defined maximum score.

The College IQAC addresses all issues concerning teaching staff PBAS. At the end of the academic year, each teacher must submit to the IQAC his or her completed PBAS-API score along with supporting documentation. This score is scrutinized and finalized in various categories. These scores are presented to University and Joint Director's authorities during the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) validation process. The teacher's diary details all of a teacher's academic, co-curricular, and extracurricular contributions. This diary is evaluated at the end of each academic year through academic audit.

The outcome of the review of API score of PBAS for a teacher is

1. A better understanding of the role and contribution of individual teachers to the department/functioning of the college.
2. Provides an idea of the teaching methods/teaching aids used by teachers in the classroom. It provides a clear picture of the number of theory and practical classes taken by a teacher during the course's completion.

3. It also focuses on teachers' academic contributions and research publications, as evidenced by the types, numbers, and quality of research papers published, research papers presented at conferences, research projects, and so on.
4. In addition to this, student's feedback on teachers is also collected in prescribed format. A final report on API score for each teacher is communicated to the Principal/Management who takes decision on whether the case has to be forwarded for promotion under CAS.
5. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in National/International Conferences/Seminars/Workshops, faculty development programmes and Refresher/Orientation programme to keep themselves abreast of the recent development in the respective areas of their subject, which is useful for their promotions.

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The teaching, learning, and evaluation processes are now effectively planned because of a system that the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has put in place. To meet the diverse needs of the students in the classroom, teachers use a variety of methods and systems for student-centric learning.

Academic Calendar:

The college develops and posts the academic calendar on the notice board at the start of each academic session. It includes the teaching days, the schedule for carrying midterms and preliminary exams, the submission of assignments, the declaration of results, the winter and summer breaks, and the co-curricular and extra-curricular activity schedule. Teaching Plan:

1. All department heads organize faculty meetings for discussions about the workload, syllabus distribution, timetable, and co-curricular and extracurricular activities provided by each department.
2. At the start of the session, the concerned teachers prepare a proposed teaching plan for the theory and practical aspects. Students are informed of the same once it has been approved by the HOD/Principal.
3. Before the start of the academic year, a diary is given to each teacher so they can keep track of all the events that take place throughout the year. The HOD and Principal examine these diaries.

Evaluation:

1. The evaluation of answer books is transparent. After every test, including unit tests, midterms, and preliminary exams, students obtain their answer books and are given feedback on their mistakes.
2. RTM Nagpur University in Nagpur is in charge of conducting the semester and annual exams. If necessary, RTM Nagpur University in Nagpur offers revaluation services.
3. The staff council meeting analyses and discusses the outcome. The principal makes recommendations to the teacher on how to improve the outcomes.

IQAC provides suggestion to improve the Teaching- learning process by following ways:

1. Providing staff members access to computers and the internet, LCD projectors in the classrooms, and modern tools and equipment in the labs.
2. Regular meetings with the IQAC and the department heads for the purpose of monitoring academic and developmental activities.
3. Assignments, midterm exams, and unit tests are used to evaluate student performance. Academic audit is one way that IQAC keeps an eye on the teaching-learning and evaluation process.
4. Conferences, seminars, workshops, and orientation and refresher courses are all encouraged for teachers to attend. The college is devoted to a participative management culture. The college's academic and administrative leadership is provided by the principal, faculty in-charge, and IQAC coordinator. IQAC sum up of academic and co-curricular matters for the preparation of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR).

Initiatives to improve the quality of teaching and learning process in the college are as follows[1]

1. Providing LCD projectors to classrooms and laboratories.
2. Resources for teachers and students, such as Internet and INFLIBNET.
3. The teacher keeps a diary and attendance records.
4. Monthly report on the completion of the syllabus.

8. College gives equal opportunities for girls in all social and cultural activities as well as promote girls for organizing and conducting various college level programs.

Best Practice No.1

Title of Practice: **Students participation in Co-Curricular Activities**

Goal:

To provide proper grooming to students so that they understand the importance of ethics and values in the formation of human character. Instill in students a sense of admiration for our nation's culture and traditions. To instill in students a sense of respect for teachers, superiors, and fellow humans. To instill in students a sense of compassion for animals. To give them the opportunity to express their own values and attitudes. To educate students about our heritage and national goals in order for them to become more sensitive and responsible citizens. To protect, preserve, and conserve the natural and cultural environment, as well as to use natural resources wisely. To instill empathy in students for society's marginalised groups.

The context:

In today's world, there is a great deal of moral degradation in society. Today's youth are perplexed as a result of the society's shifting value system, which has left them in a bind. As a result, in order to instill ethics and human values in tertiary students, it is essential that the students' attitude and approach to these attributes be properly conceived. As a result, value education should not be regarded as a separate discipline, but rather as something that should be ingrained in the educational system. Aside from that, students learn life skills such as communication, critical thinking, self-confidence, and others that will help them in today's competitive world. These energising activities transform higher education institutions into true nurturing homes for responsible citizens of the nation, rather than mere teaching establishments.

Practice:

Co-curricular activities assist students in developing self-esteem, overcoming shyness and inferiority complexes, and identifying their potential abilities and skills. Activities such as kavay lekhan, Elocution Competition, Essay Competition, and others were held to instill values in students, and the college also celebrated the birthdays of national leaders such as Mahatma Gandhi, Savitribai Fule, Abul Kalam Azad, Swamy Vivekananda, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar, and others. We are committed to improving our students' scientific temper by organising various science-related events and activities, as well as commemorating days such as National Science Day. In addition, plantation drives, awareness rallies, and cleanliness camps were held.

Evidence of Success:

1. There has been a significant shift in students' behaviour and attitudes towards these aspects of life.
2. Because the programme is entirely organised by students, they are exposed to event management techniques at the same time.
3. The students' development of a scientific temperament and positive thinking is noteworthy.
4. Life achievement is envisioned in these programmes.
5. Students are forced to learn concepts that are not related to their regular subjects.

Problems faced:

When scheduling activities, issues such as managing schedules for multiple classes and students frequently arise. As a result, a teacher must make adjustments to the timetable for carrying out the activities. Because they are ungraded and do not provide academic credit, students regard them as a burden, and some students believe that participating in co-curricular activities automatically leads to poor academic performance. Furthermore, due to academic pressure, students focus solely on one subject. Health education sessions are held when the people of the village are available. Another obstacle is the cost of attending a government-sponsored college. The administration's attitude is favourable to pursuing this quality-adopted enhancement and extension activity. More departments are overcoming them by submitting these types of proposals. The main impediment is finance and government audit procedures. There are no guidelines, and the institution's head is asked for comments during the audit for these activities. However, in addition to the college contribution, the staffs contribute voluntarily to the program's success.

Best Practice No.2

2. Bird Conservation through Artificial Birds' Nests and Provide Feedings

Goal:

A bird's populations are currently declining due to pollution, cutting trees and hunting, etc In order to increase the population of birds and conservation of these species to provide nests, and food. Through this practice, institution wants to conserve birds in and around seloo village.

The context:

The house sparrows that one's chirped around in large numbers are now spotted rarely. It is due to high rise buildings, lack of greenery and radiation from cell phone towers. There is a shortage of feed too as agricultural land has been replaced with buildings. Such changes affect the breeding efficiency of the birds which results in declining their number.

The Practice:

In order to increase the population of birds and providing artificial nesting, our institution has carried out a project with the help of NSS students and Department of Zoology. During the five years, more than hundreds of artificial nests have been placed on the trees of around the College campus and in and around Seloo village.

Through this practice, Institution has taken initiatives to make artificial bird's nests and placing them at various places (trees) and providing feeding (grains) to them.

For this practice financial resource was generated from the institution Rs.20,000/- and Rs.15,000/- was collected from the staff members and selling of old newspapers, respectively. Students and staff collected the food grains which are used to feed the birds at specific feeding places.

Evidence of Success:

Through this practice, birds population are increased by getting artificial nest, our Zoology Department is monitoring to this practice to maintain their population by giving them food regularly with help of staff, NSS students and Alumni Association. Our Zoology department got award of appreciation from Nagar Panchayat, Seloo and Nature Conservationists.

Problems faced:

The main problem of this practice is financial support, it needs lots of money to make artificial birds nest, suitable place to put it, and daily monitoring. Our college gets very less time to monitoring theme and feed them regularly. But due to all problems, we created a committee to monitoring and feed regularly as well as to solve the financial support by the cooperation of staff and Alumni Association.
